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PUT ON YOUR YARMULKE, IT'S TIME FOR HANUKKAH!

When someone asks, "what time is Hanukkah this year?", we love to tell the old joke, "same time it is every year: the 25th of Kislev."

That just happens to fall at the end of November this year. If we go by the prevailing calendar, sure, it's early!

Well, CBI is ready. You know we rock the Festival of Lights, with Rabbi Siemers leading us in Peter, Paul and Mary's "Light One Candle," Leah Kresge organizing a great shindig for our kids, and the Sisterhood making latkes and running their Hanukkah sales.

It's a great time of the year to connect with the community, and it's much needed after the long night of the pandemic.

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RABBI'S MESSAGE BILL SIEMERS

Dear Friends,

Much of our tradition takes the eternity of heaven and earth to be a given - whenever the Torah wishes to make a point it calls them to be witnesses against treacherous humanity. And throughout the days of introspection we have just finished it is impossible not to sense our own smallness in the face of a seemingly static universe. Compared to the stars, the psalmist asks, "what is man that mention should be made"? We behold our beautiful forests and great rivers, illumined by the steady rising and setting of the sun, and we can't help but project a permanence upon our surroundings to set against our fleeting existence.

We know, though, that even though it is very old the earth is not eternal and that the conditions which permit our existence are but a chapter in the long history of our home. Since the late seventies, there has been a theoretical concern that the byproducts of modernity could cause the planet's temperature to rise and in our time the concern has become acute. In both America and Israel, the collection of "hundred year" fires and floods has challenged our way of life, and has suggested that we are moving from the theory to the actual.

Our tradition trains us to understand ourselves as stewards and not possessors of Creation. The practice of saying blessings before we enjoy any aspect of the world reminds us throughout the day that we are dependent upon resources we cannot create. Before each meal we thank the one who brings forth bread from the earth: I can purchase flour and I can bake loaves, but I cannot create seeds, earth or water. Evening and morning we recite the paragraph from the Shema that teaches of the collective responsibility that is required to address our vulnerability in a land where our most critical resource falls unpredictably from the sky. And in Israel this year we observe the Shemitah - the commandment to let the land rest in the seventh year - in order to remind us that precious resources are not to be possessed but protected.

The connections between our tradition and the challenges we face are manifold, and it is our intention to devote the coming year to exploring how the texts we study relate to the task at hand. We are going to present the issue from the perspective of scientists who hold the best views of the current problem and its trajectory, of activists who seek to formulate a response, and of thinkers who have studied the nexus between Jewish and environmental thought. We will look at the problem from a global perspective, but also consider the effects of climate change on the places that we carry in our hearts - our beautiful state and of our home in Israel. And we will consider responses to the crisis encompassing public action and personal contemplation. Throughout, we will deepen our commitments to be better citizens and more learned Jews. I hope that you will support and join us on this exciting journey.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE BRIAN KRESGE

I hate Zoom services. Hate 'em.

I have worked remotely for well over 5-years now, beginning long before the pandemic started. When I was still a single father to Amelia, back in 2004 and 2005, I worked remotely as well, juggling infant/toddler on my lap as I worked on software. However, it's only in recent years that my work life revolved around Zoom or Microsoft Teams.

Meetings are terrible over the Internet.

I see minyans the same way. Zoom is just intrusive. It's nice if you're away and would like to be a part of CBI, but it's not great if it's the norm.

What about the risk?

Risk mitigation was major component of operations as I gained rank in the military. We're not a congregation of paratroopers, but the principles apply. We identify the risks, and we do what we can to offset them.

In the end it comes down to a choice: what level of risk do we assume to fulfill our mission? For us, our high vaccination rate, masking, and a healthy respect for distance should be enough.

Within that, we still have to remember that we are a community of friends. We don't just weigh what we do and the decisions we make against process and policy. We consider the "who." We consider that there is a baseline of trust assumed to exist between members of our community. Member, nonmember, whatever...our friendships **must** come first.

I've had the sense, in recent months, that many of us are chafing. We're dissatisfied, all of us, with conditions imposed by a pandemic. Perhaps we're upset with leadership decisions. Perhaps we're vexed by the constant changes to our services.

I ask us all to take a step back and remember the centrality of Judaism to our lives, and how Congregation Beth Israel is the place best-suited to realize that. We won't always get it right, but we don't usually get it wrong.

With that, we need your help. Those that can, this year, we ask you chip in a little more to ease the stresses on our general fund. Get your Yom Kippur pledges in, perhaps put a little padding on your dues payments. If you received an Aliyah or honor, our custom is to send in a donation related in some way to 18, or "chai."

What you'll get in return? We have an ambitious slate of programming this year. We're making serious improvements to our original building, by making the ground-floor kitchen generally viable and our chapel viable again.
